Whereas adequate mass transportation facilities are sorely needed in every major metropolitan area in America to transport people efficiently and economically, and

Whereas such mass transportation facilities cannot now be funded adequately because of lack of commitment of Federal resources and technical capabilities, and

Whereas the decision will soon be made on continued Federal funding for the development of supersonic transports and a decision in favor of further funding would not reflect a balanced allocation of the Nation's human and economic resources, and

Whereas commitment of funds equal to those now being contemplated for the supersonic transport program would produce jobs in the number equal to or greater than those predicted in the supersonic transport program, and

Whereas the appropriation level for the Urban Mass Transportation Administration in the Department of Transportation for fiscal year 1971 was \$600,000,000 and the budgetary allocation for this program was only \$400,000,000, and

Whereas it is the strong sense of this Congress that a shift of allocation of these resources to the development of efficient and economical mass transit systems would better serve the national interest by solving a crisis in transportation which more critically affects a clear majority of the country's population: Therefore be it
